What is the importance of a personal statement? It is the only component in your application department that is not based solely on your test scores and other people's perception of you. You have total control and it will allow you to personalize your application. A vast majority of application officer place heavy emphasis on personal statements. That is why you need to make sure that you create a very good pediatrics residency personal statement can be a great asset to your application.

TIPS AND SUGGESTIONS FOR WRITING A PERSONAL STATEMENT:

- Recall your medical application personal statement. That can be a great basis for your [pediatric residency application personal statement](#). Utilize our previous introduction and final paragraphs if they were solid.
- Find out if your school has a good writing office. They could help you write a good statement.
- Structure your personal statement on a theme. This will help you create an organized statement.
- Write experiences that were relevant to your life, goals and experiences.
- Make your statement short but meaningful. Avoid using unnecessary and flowery words.
- For great results, start your statement with an attention grabber like a quote, a story, an anecdote, or even a riddle.
- Make sure that you finish your statement with a conclusion that refers back to the introduction. This will provide a proper conclusion of the statement.
- Ask your department program head to critique or evaluate your statement.
- Proofread your statement. Twice.
- Write about anything that you have interest in. You will be surprised how positive the vibes your personal statement emits.
- Take a break after writing your personal statement. Take a day or week. This will provide you a fresh perspective of what you have written and you can then add, remove or edit some entries properly.

MISTAKES TO AVOID IN WRITING A PERSONAL STATEMENT:

- × Underestimating the importance of personal statement
- × Underestimating writing a personal statement
- × Lack of a fluid transition between the introduction, body and ending
- × Using bad grammar and committing spelling errors
- × Using cliché and generic statements
- × Writing with a help of a group. Remember that this is all about you and what you can offer to the program.
- × Being too cute. Being strange or quirky is not a good idea when applying for a pediatric residency application.
- × Procrastinating. Keep in mind that writing a good personal statement takes time.
- × Being a know it all. Make sure that you can discuss or elaborate the things that you write in an interview.

HOW TO ANSWER PEDIATRIC RESIDENCY INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

Before attending a residency interview, here are things that you need to consider:

- ✓ It is normal to be a bit nervous when you enter an interview room. Some people can cope up real quick but there are things you can do before and during an interview that can help you get rid of the jitters.
- ✓ Always be on time to avoid rushing. Rushing adds to the anxiety and you will lose your cool.
- ✓ Take a deep breath before entering the interview room. It will work wonders to your composure.
- ✓ See if you can get the names of the interviewer or interviewers. Knowing who you will talk to will reduce nervousness.
- ✓ Look into the eyes of the person interviewing you. Greet them by their name and don't forget to offer a firm handshake.
- ✓ Smile. It will surely help.
- ✓ Be the last one to sit down. This is an old fashioned manner but is still applicable and very polite.
- ✓ Refuse coffee or tea that is being offered if you think you are already tensed enough.

There are questions that are routinely asked by interviewers to applicants. There are already readymade answers to them that are likewise common. There are questions that interviewers think that are appropriate and some that are not. The most difficult kind of questions but also very common are open-ended ones. There are many applicants that get the jitters when asked to tell something about themselves or what they want to know about the program.

- ✓ Why did you choose this specialty?
- ✓ Why are you interested in this program?
- ✓ What are your goals?
- ✓ Tell me about yourself?
- ✓ What did you do before medicine? (To an older student)
- ✓ Why should we pick you?
- ✓ What are your strengths?
- ✓ What are your weaknesses?
- ✓ Where else have you applied?
- ✓ Are you interested in academic or in clinical medicine?
- ✓ Do you want to do research?
- ✓ Where will you rank us?
- ✓ What was the most interesting case that you have been involved in?
- ✓ Present a case that you handled during medical school.
- ✓ Do you plan to do a fellowship?
- ✓ What could you offer this program?
- ✓ How do you rank in your class?
- ✓ Do you see any problems managing a professional and a personal life?
- ✓ Are you prepared for the rigors of residency?
- ✓ Where do you see yourself in 5 years?
- ✓ What questions do you have?

MORE ABOUT INTERVIEWS

Every time you answer a question, make it a point to distinguish yourself from other applicants. This is unfortunately not easy to do. Common questions like “why do you want to be a doctor?” is usually answer by “to save lives.” Of course you can answer that. But to truly distinguish you from other applicants, describe the reasons or the experiences that you have why you were convinced to ho down this career’s road. Think about the things that happened to your life, what are the things happening now and what you want to happen in the future. You need to tell your own story. Know yourself first before presenting yourself to others.

QUESTIONS THAT YOU CAN ASK IN AN INTERVIEW:

- ✓ What is the philosophy of the program?
- ✓ Who are the faculty?
- ✓ What kind of curriculum is offered?
- ✓ How many hospitals participate in the program?
